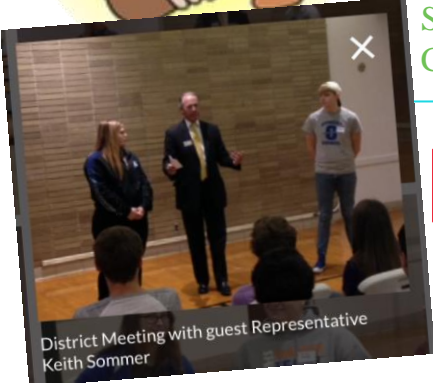

On Tuesday, April 4, 2017, local elections took place across the state of Illinois. Unlike state and national elections, local elections have a much more direct impact on voters. This year, the Illinois Association of Student Councils' very own Isaiah Harlan of Galesburg High School and the Hopewell District ran for a position on the Galesburg C.U.S.D. #205 Board of Education. Harlan, the youngest of this year's candidates at only 18 years old, earned 1,027 votes (14.32%). 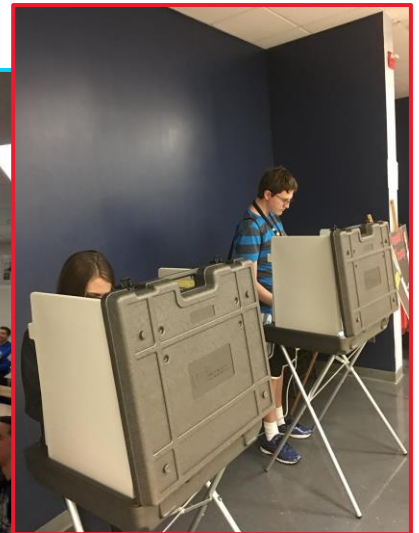
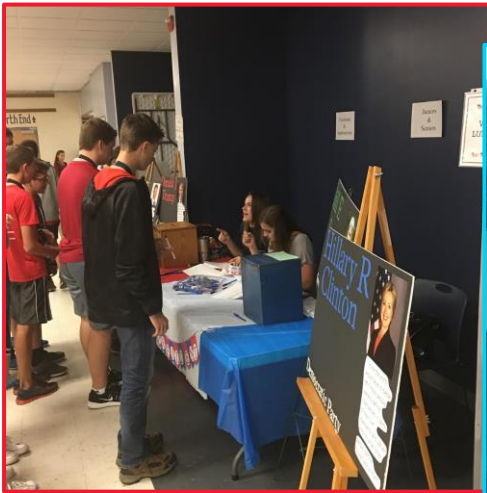

- \*Johnsburg High School: Clinton/Kaine (29%) -- Trump/Pence (54%)**
- Olympia High School: Clinton/Kaine (23%) -- Trump/Pence (73%)**
